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Following are recent reports from Arkansas' tourism industry.

New Crystal Bridges exec

Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art and its contemporary art and performance venue, the Momentary, in Bentonville, have promoted Lela Davidson to chief operating officer. According to a news release, Davidson will manage all operations to "enhance the museums' outreach, revenue, and reputation." (May 16)

Casino fight

Investing in Arkansas has formed to oppose a possible constitutional amendment to repeal a controversial Pope County casino license. The latest move is part of ongoing legal actions by the Choctaw Nation and the Cherokee Nation for the lucrative gaming license. (May 14)

Hemingway writer

Annmarie Kelly-Harbaugh, an Ohio native, has been selected as the writer-in-residence at the Hemingway-Pfeiffer Museum and Educational Center (HPMEC) in Piggott. She is the author of "Here Be Dragons: A Parent's Guide to Rediscovering Purpose, Adventure and the Unfathomable Joy of the Journey." (May 7)

New marketing director

The Little Rock Convention & Visitors Bureau (LRCVB) announced April 16 the hiring of Olumide Yerokun as director of marketing. Yerokun will manage a variety of promotional strategies and activities to boost the bureau's tourism efforts for Little Rock. (April 16)

Nature Center money

The Fort Chaffee Redevelopment Authority (FCRA) has contributed \$500,000 to a reimagined Janet Huckabee River Valley Nature Center (JHRVC). A fundraising campaign to help the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission expand the center was announced in March 2023. (April 11)



Arkansas Tourism Ticker: 2% tourism tax revenue remains on record pace

Arkansas' 2% tourism tax revenue between January and February was \$3.4 million, up 8.7% compared with \$3.12 million in the same period of 2023. Revenue in each of the first two months of 2024 set a new record, with those gains compared to record numbers in 2023. A record for monthly collections was set in June 2023 with \$2.71 million.


The tourism tax revenue in 2023 was \$25.44 million, up 5.8% compared with \$24.04 million in 2022. Revenue in each month of 2023 set a new record, with those gains compared to record numbers in 2022. The 2% revenue was boosted in part by 13.7% and 8% year-over-year gains, respectively, in Benton and Pulaski counties. A record for monthly 2% collections was set in June 2023 with \$2.71 million.

January-February hospitality tax collections among 17 cities surveyed for the Arkansas Tourism Ticker were up 5.07% compared with the same period in 2022.

The Arkansas Tourism Ticker is managed by Talk Business & Politics, and sponsored by the Arkansas Hospitality Association. The ticker uses the following three measurements to review the health of the state's tourism industry.

- Hospitality tax collections prepared food tax and lodging tax of 17 Arkansas cities (cities listed on Page 6 along with collections for each city);
- Tourism sector employment numbers as reported by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics; and
- Collections of Arkansas' 2% statewide tourism tax. **TBP**

Hospitality tax revenue in 17 cities moderates to begin 2024

The combined hospitality tax collections in the 17 cities totaled \$10.59 million in January-February 2024, up 1.55% compared with \$10.43 million in the same period of 2023.

Restaurant (prepared food tax) tax collections among the 17 cities totaled \$8.404 million in January-February 2024, ahead of \$8.08 million in the same period of 2023. Hotel tax collections among the 17 cities totaled \$2.19 million in January-February 2024, down compared with \$2.35 million in the same period of 2023.

Of the 17 cities surveyed for the Arkansas Tourism Ticker, 10 posted hospitality tax collection increases in January-February 2024 compared with the same period in 2023. **TEP**

Arkansas' travel and tourism sector job growth moderates

Monthly average tourism sector jobs in January-February 2024 was 127,700, up 0.5% compared with 127,000 in the same period of 2023. The sector reached record monthly employment of 128,100 in February, and rose to a new record of 130,400 in March. Sector jobs have fully recovered from the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic when job numbers fell to an estimated 74,300 in April 2020.

Of the eight metro areas in or connected to Arkansas, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics provides tourism employment data on five. Of the five, three posted employment gains compared with the same period in 2023, with Texarkana posting the largest percentage increase at 0.76%. Following is the average monthly employment during the first two months of 2024 for the metro regions.


